approximately 360 feet horizontally and +55 feet in vertical elevation. Wetland A is fed by precipitation and runoff from the surrounding site. The wetland would not overflow into the tributary during times of extreme flooding or other weather conditions. The land between the isolated water and the tributary is 80% forested and 20% open field. Wetland A is located in a 44.68-acre park on Squak Mountain and is located in an approximately 2-acre area with a manicured lawn lined with tress in a residential and forested area. Grading was done to establish the park where no wetland was previously present. The soil surrounding the isolated water are non-hydric and well drained; therefore, there is no shallow subsurface connection to the nearest tributary. According to FEMA's Flood Map, accessed on 13 September 2022, the isolated water is not within a floodplain. There is no special significance that would attract interstate travelers to the site. There is no product from the site being sold. There is no hydrological connection to a water of the U.S. via underground or surface water. Wetland A is not an impoundment of a tributary. Wetland A is hydrologically isolated and has no interstate commerce connection.
