Specifications for Security Fence Libby Dam Project

The following specifications are for the security fence that will be installed on both sides of the river on the down streamside of the Libby Dam.

Fence Specifications:

- All fence fabric to be 9 gauge.
- All pipe frame material to be schedule 40.
- All top rail to be 1 5/8 inches ss40 connected with sleeves.
- All line post to be 2 3/8 inches ss50 set in at least 2 feet of concrete.
- All terminal posts to be 2 7/8 inches ss40 set at least 2 feet in concrete.
- Post spacing to be 10 feet or less.
- Post spacing across riprap banks will be varied due to the conditions but in no case to exceed 10 feet. These lines may not be straight but every effort should be made to keep them as straight as possible.
- All post holes must be at least 2 feet in depth and at least 9 inches in diameter.

The following measurements are estimated. The contractor will be responsible for actual field measurements/dimensions. Please see the attached drawing for the fence locations.

Left Bank Fence:

Section A - 65 feet from the river to the top of the bank. The entire area is covered with large riprap.

Section B - 55 feet from the top of the bank to the Silling Basin Bridge Access Road.

Right Bank Fence:

Section C - 65 feet from the river to the retaining wall. The entire area is covered with large riprap.

Section D - 85 feet from the main gate to the top of hillside slope. The entire area is covered with medium size riprap.

Section E - 55 feet across the flat to the trees.
